

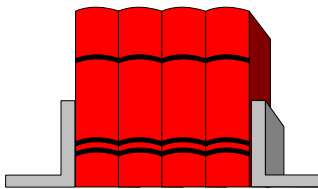

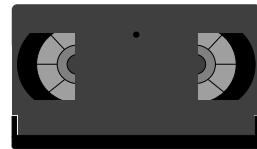


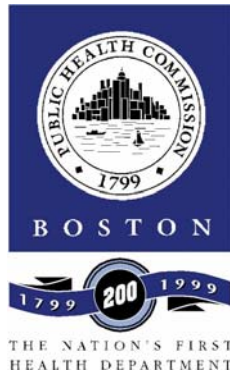

A Gathering of Heroes: Reflections on Rage and Responsibility: A Memoir of the Los Angeles Riots. Alan-Williams, Gregory. Chicago: Academy Chicago Pub. 1994

Alan-Williams is an African American TV actor, who, at the height of the Los Angeles riots nearly two years ago, deliberately set out for the epicenter of the violence. At the heart of the book is a searing eyewitness account of the frightful brutality and lawlessness of that day in Los Angeles.

Assessing Dangerousness: Violence by Sexual Offenders, Batterers, and Child Abusers.

Campbell, Jacquelyn C., ed. Thousand Oaks, CA: Sage Pub, 1995.

Experts from various fields discuss the ability and limitations in predicting dangerousness. Topics include violence against children, battered women, sexual offenders and homicide by battered women. Includes index.

Battered Wives. Martin, Del. Revised. Volcano, CA: Volcano Press, 1981. **(2 Copies).**

The first book to analyze the history of wife abuse and the response of social and legal institutions.

The Battered Woman. Walker, Lenore. NYC: Harper & Row, 1979.

Seminal work on the feminist theory of domestic violence. Focus on the Cycle of Violence, the psychology of battering and coercive techniques used by batterers. Discusses the role of shelters and the legal and medical communities in helping women escape and reclaim their lives.

Battered Women, Children, and Welfare Reform: The Ties That Bind. Brandwein, Ruth A., ed. Thousand Oaks, CA: Sage Pub, 1999.

Academics, practitioners, advocates and policy makers shed light on the complex issues of family violence, welfare reform and child welfare; illustrating the two-way street between poverty and abuse and the barriers preventing women from escaping the deadly cycle.

Battered Women in the Courtroom. The Power of Judicial Responses (The Northeastern Series on Gender, Crime, and Law). James Ptacek. Boston NEU Press. 1999.

“Battered Women in the Courtroom” probes for the first time the ways in which judges respond to women who are seeking legal redress in seeking protection from abusive men. This investigation of women, violence, and the courts centers on encounters between women and judges in restraining order hearings in Massachusetts, one of the first states to offer new civil and criminal options to victims of abusive behavior. It also examines the feminist political movements that gave rise to current state laws and considers the effects of men's violence on women's daily lives.

The Batterer as Parent: Addressing the Impact of Domestic Violence on Family Dynamics. Bancroft, Lundy and Silverman, Jay G. Thousand Oaks, CA: Sage Pub 2002.

Bancroft and Silverman show how partner abuse affects each relationship in a family, and explain how children's emotional recovery is inextricably linked to the healing and empowerment of their mothers. The authors cover the important often-overlooked area of post-separation parenting behaviors of men who batter. Readers are guided in evaluating change in the parenting of men who batter; assessing risk to children from unsupervised visitation; and supporting the emotional recovery of children.

Batterer Intervention Systems: Issues, Outcomes, and Recommendations. Gondolf, Edward W. Thousand Oaks, CA: Sage Pub 2002.

This book responds to the debate about the effectiveness of batterer programs and the measures needed for their improvement. Gondolf critiques current experimental evaluations; exposes the complex issue of evaluation; and presents alternatives to assessing effectiveness. A four-year follow-up of program participants is included revealing surprising results.

Black Family Violence: Current Research and Theory. Hampton, Robert L., ed. Lexington, MA: Lexington Books, 1991.

Compiled studies of violence in black families from spousal violence to elder abuse. Hampton concludes with ideas for preventing violence. Includes an index.

Boston's Book of Peace, Vol. VI. Chéry, Joseph M., ed. Dorchester, MA: Louis D. Brown Peace Institute, 2000.

Award winning essays on Peace by the students in the Louis D. Brown Peace curriculum.

Boys Will Be Boys: Breaking the Link Between Masculinity and Violence. Miedzian, Myriam. NY: Anchor Books, 1991.

"How and why American males are increasingly turning to violence and what we, as individuals and as a society, can do about it."

Breaking Free from Partner Abuse : Voices of Battered Women Caught in the Cycle of Domestic Violence. Mary Marecek Morning Glory Press 1999.

Geared toward all women experiencing violence in a relationship whether at the hands of a same-sex or heterosexual partner. This book provides affirmation and direction to move past the struggles and start to heal. By drawing from a diverse population and using poetry, prose, illustrations, and the words of abused women, this resource covers the many important and often difficult issues, such as a battered-person's rights, how to leave an abuser, understanding physical violence, lesbian battering, and women's shelters. The guide also addresses many of the reasons why women stay in violent relationships and explains the concepts of boundaries and self-identity.

Bringing it out in the open: Domestic violence in Northern Ireland: a study commissioned by the Department of Health and Social Services (Northern Ireland). McWilliams Monica & McKiernan, Joan. Belfast: HMSO, 1993.

The findings of a major study of domestic violence in Northern Ireland involving both help-seekers and help-providers; includes 120 interviews and 13 recommendations.

Chain Chain Change: For Black Women Dealing With Physical and Emotional Abuse. White, Evelyn C. Seattle, WA: Seal Press, 1985.

Directed toward Black women who want to understand the role of emotional abuse and violence in their lives, and to the professionals who work with them. Includes what to expect and how to deal with the civil and social symptoms, e.g., courts and hospitals. Additional readings and resources included.

Children and trauma: A parent's guide to helping children. Cynthia Monahon. NYC: Lexington Books.

Children and Trauma teaches parents and professionals about the effects of such ordeals on children and offers a blueprint for restoring a child's sense of safety and balance. Cynthia Monahon, a child psychologist who specializes in the treatment of psychological trauma, offers hope and reassurance for parents.

Children Who See Too Much: Lessons from the Child Witness to Violence Project. Groves, Betsy McAlister. Boston, MA: Beacon Press, 2002.

"Groves draws on the Child Witness to Violence Project's award-winning counseling and training programs for parents, and (professionals) to lay out ways adults can understand and protect the very young children all around us who see too much." Includes an appendix on talking with young children about terrorism and war.

Coercive Control. How men entrap women in personal life. Evan Stark. Publisher: Oxford University Press 2007

Despite its great achievements, the domestic violence revolution is stalled, Evan Stark argues, a provocative conclusion he documents by showing that interventions have failed to improve women's long-term safety in relationships or to hold perpetrators accountable. Stark traces this failure to a startling paradox, that the singular focus on violence against women masks an even more devastating reality. In millions of abusive relationships, men use a largely unidentified form of subjugation that more closely resembles kidnapping or indentured servitude than assault. He calls this pattern coercive control. Drawing on sources that range from FBI statistics and film to dozens of actual cases from his thirty years of experience as an award-winning researcher, advocate, and forensic expert, Stark shows in terrifying detail how men can use coercive control to extend their dominance over time and through social space in ways that subvert women's autonomy, isolate them, and infiltrate the most intimate corners of their lives. Against this backdrop, Stark analyzes the cases of three women tried for crimes committed in the context of abuse, showing that their reactions are only intelligible when they are reframed as victims of coercive control rather than as battered wives. The story of physical and sexual violence against women has been told often. But this is the first book to show that most abused women who seek help do so because their rights and liberties have been jeopardized, not

because they have been injured. The coercive control model Stark develops resolves three of the most perplexing challenges posed by abuse: why these relationships endure, why abused women develop a profile of problems seen among no other group of assault victims, and why the legal system has failed to win them justice. Elevating coercive control from a second-class misdemeanor to a human rights violation, Stark explains why law, policy, and advocacy must shift its focus to emphasize how coercive control jeopardizes women's freedom in everyday life. Fiercely argued and eminently readable, Stark's work is certain to breathe new life into the domestic violence revolution.

Confronting Chronic Neglect: The Education and Training of Health Professionals on Family Violence. Cohn, Felicia; Salmon, Marla E.; and Stobo, John D., eds. Wash., DC: National Academy Press, 2002.

A report from the Institute of Medicine's Committee on the Training Needs of Health Professionals to Respond to Family Violence. This report defines the problem and outlines current educational activities in the health professions; forces which influence health professionals' education; and, evaluation of training efforts. The report describes and recommends priorities for health professional training on family violence.

Appendices for mandatory reporting laws for family violence; existing curricula on family violence; and core competencies for family violence, among others are included.

Counseling Victims of Violence. Brown, Sandra L. Alexandria: American Counseling Assoc. 1991.

Points to practical approaches for counseling victims of violence. Brown provides insights on victim concerns, intervention techniques, social service agencies, short-term, and long-term counseling issues. Brown does not specify "how-to" techniques for counselors and therapists working with trauma victims; rather she describes a developmental intervention strategy approach. Integrative counseling strategies are pointed to throughout because victims of violence often require a variety of support networks (e.g., crisis intervention, suicide prevention, substance abuse counseling, group counseling, etc.) Brown also discusses the high burnout rate experienced by trauma victim counselors.

Consumer Rights for Domestic Violence Survivors: Massachusetts edition. Wu, Chi Chi and Loonin, Deanne. Boston, MA: National Consumer Law Center, Inc. 2003.

"The survivor's fragile financial and emotional situation may make her vulnerable to predatory behavior. The survivor may have been the target of financial abuse as well, and may lack experience dealing with money and basic financial literacy skills. This handbook is intended to assist advocates for domestic violence survivors grappling with these issues."

The Courage To Heal: A Guide for Women Survivors of Child Sexual Abuse. Bass, Ellen and Davis, Laura. NYC: HarperCollins Publishers, 1988.

"The authors weave personal experience with professional knowledge to show the reader how she can come to terms with her past while moving powerfully into the future." Offers comprehensive and practical suggestions for embarking on the recovery process.

The Courage To Heal: A Guide for Women Survivors of Child Sexual Abuse. 3rd Ed.
Bass, Ellen & Davis, Laura. NYC: HarperCollins Pub. 1994.
Updated. Third edition.

The Cross-Cultural Study of Women. Dudley, Margot I. and Edwards, Mary I. NYC: The Feminist Press, 1986.

This guide to research and issues in the cross-cultural study of women is intended for a variety of uses; and can be readily used by instructors in colleges and universities. Study is acceptable as core curriculum and as supplemental material for women's study courses.

Culture and Family Violence: Fostering change through human rights law. Levesque, Roger J.R. Washington, DC: American Psychological Association, 2001.

Levesque describes the policies meant to protect families but repeatedly fail to protect individuals within those families. He explores the cultural beliefs and laws that support the family unit as a safe haven. Levesque discusses the range of family violence, such as child exploitation; adolescent relationship violence; elder neglect; and spousal abuse.

Current Controversies on Family Violence. Gelles, Richard J. and Loseke, Donileen R., eds. Newbury Park, CA: Sage Pub, 1993.

Opposing view essays on the meaning and definition, measurement, causes and consequences, and social intervention in family violence.

Domestic Tyranny: The Making of American Social Policy Against Family Violence from Colonial Times to the Present. 2004 Chicago: U of Illinois Pr. M,

This book chronicles the rise and demise of legal, political, and medical campaigns against domestic violence from colonial times to the present. Based on in-depth research into court records, newspaper accounts, and autobiographies, this book argues that the single most consistent barrier to reform against domestic violence has been the Family Ideal--that is, ideas about family privacy, conjugal and parental rights, and family stability.

Domestic Violence and Health Care: What Every Professional Needs To Know.

SchorNSTein, Sherri L. Thousand Oaks, CA: Sage Pub 1997.

An easy-to-read, comprehensive guide for health care professionals about providing effective and compassionate care to victims of domestic violence. Addresses clinical, legal, and safety issues; highlights the need for a community-based, multi-disciplinary response.

Domestic Violence: The Criminal Justice Response (Studies in Crime, Law, and Criminal Justice). 2nd ed. Eve S. Buzawa, Carl G. Buzawa. London: Sage 1996.

Domestic violence is a trauma for not only the victims but also neighbors, the police, social workers and the courts. To what extent do the courts and existing legislation control, prevent or punish domestic violence? Is there a police response or non-response to domestic violence and to what extent will this improve in the future? Have the various

social service agencies had an effect on curbing domestic violence? This book addresses these questions in a clear and organized manner and focuses on the response of the various institutions involved. The book discusses various policy implications, gives a full account of the present situation and makes some interesting recommendations for the future.

Empowering and Healing the Battered Woman: A Model for Assessment and Intervention. Dutton, Mary Ann. NYC: Springer Publishing Company, 1992.

Presents a detailed psychological model of domestic violence and the battering phenomenon. Provides a framework for mental health professionals to more appropriately, sensitively, and effectively assist their battered patients. Contains appendices that can be used by providers in their evaluation and treatment of patients.

Ending the Cycle of Violence: Community Responses to Children of Battered Women. Peled, Einat; Jaffe, Peter G.; Edleson, Jeffrey L., eds. Thousand Oaks, CA: Sage Pub, 1995. (2 Copies)

A collection of writings on intervention for children of battered women. Includes name and subject indices.

Facing history and ourselves: holocaust and human behavior. Margot Stern Strom; William S Parsons Watertown, Mass.: Intentional Ed, Inc., 1982

This book helps to confront the complexities of history in ways that promote critical and creative thinking about the challenges they face and the opportunities they have for positive change. The book begins with short stories and autobiographical accounts that help students look at *ourselves*--who *we* are and how *our* identity is formed. The book then considers how three sets of ideas have shaped not only individual identity but also national identity, including that of the United States. Those ideas are *democracy, race, and nationalism*.

Family Violence and Religion; an interfaith resource guide. Volcano Press staff, eds. Volcano, CA: Volcano Press, 1995.

“This book provides an exceptional resource for clergy to understand family violence and respond appropriately. It acknowledges both secular awareness and religious concerns. It identifies how the issues of diverse theology, ethnicity, age, and community particularize the prevailing characteristics of family violence.”

Family Violence: Prevention and Treatment. Hampton, Robert et. al., Newbury Park, CA: Sage Pub, 1993.

Researchers and clinicians examine the roots of family violence, as well as its assessment and treatment. Includes an index.

Feminist Perspectives on Wife Abuse. Yllo, Kersti and Bograd, Michelle, eds. Newbury Park, CA: Sage Pub, 1998.

Compilation of articles on wife abuse from social scientists and activists.

For Shelter and Beyond. Ending violence against battered women and their children 2nd ed. Boston: MCBWSG 1990

A Good Fight. Sarah Brady. McLoughlin, Merrill 2002

On March 30, 1981, Sarah Brady's husband James was critically injured during an assassination attempt on President Ronald Reagan. Some years later, she presided over passage of a handgun control law known as the Brady Bill. Now, in *A Good Fight*, Brady tells the compelling human story behind these news events in a voice laced with honesty, humor, and a complete absence of self-pity.

Hate Crimes: Confronting violence against lesbians and gay men. Herek, Gregory M. and Berrill, Kevin T., eds. Newbury Park, CA: Sage Pub, Inc., 1992.

This volume is devoted to an exploration of anti-gay prejudice and violence. Individual papers "discuss the concept of 'hate crime,' recent trends, contexts of violence, the AIDS impact, research methodology, perpetrators (adult and juvenile), survivors, and responses by lesbians and gay men, with special attention to 1980s organizing in New York City, San Francisco, and on campuses." Chapter bibliographies.

I Can Make My World a Safer Place: A Kid's Book About Stopping Violence

By Paul Kivel. Hunter House, 2001

"I Can Make My World a Safer Place" engages young readers in thinking about how to promote peace at home, in the neighborhood, and in the world. Topics include: Teasing and bullies; Fights, gangs and weapons; Personal safety from physical, emotional and sexual abuse; Public safety in the community; Anger, drugs and suicide; and Toys and violence in the media. Get involved in making peace

***MISSING: Intimate Betrayal: Understanding and Responding to the Trauma of Acquaintance Rape.** Wiehe, Vernon R. and Richards, Anne L. Thousand Oaks, CA: Sage Pub, 1995.

Explains acquaintance rape, its impact on the victim, intervention and prevention. Also discusses marital rape. Includes an index.

It's My Life Now: Starting Over After an Abusive Relationship or Domestic Violence. Meg Kennedy Dugan, Roger R. Hock Routledge 2000.

This book offers encouragement and practical advice to women who seek to repair their self-esteem, assess their safety and move on to better lives. This is a comprehensive guide through process of healing for survivors and for the people who love them.

Living With The Enemy. Photographs by Donna Ferrato. Introduction by Ann Jones Aperture; 1st ed. 1992

Searing photographic images of woman battering-the beatings, the wounds, the crying children, the police in the house-with riveting text as well. A crucial work by an award-winning photographer.

Leaving Abusive Partners: From the Scars of Survival to the Wisdom for Change.

Kirkwood, Catherine. London: Sage Pub, 1993.

Examines "...the emotional and practical struggles English women confront after leaving an abusive relationship, and demonstrates how formerly abused women create a process of survival and personal change." Includes an index.

Man Against Woman: What Every Woman Should Know About Violent Men. Gondolf, Edward W. Blue Ridge Summit, PA: Tab Books, Inc., 1989.

Examines why men are violent and the possibility of their changing. Considers battering a gender issue. Appendices include listings of relevant organizations and hotlines. Includes annotated bibliography.

Man to Man: A Guide for Men in Abusive Relationships. Gondolf, Edward W. and Russell, David M. New York: Sulzburger and Graham Publishing, 1994.

Directed toward male batterers, with suggestions for change and testimony from men who have changed. Seeks to convince abusers to get help. Provides a list of self-help books and a directory of programs for batterers.

Men Who Batter: An Integrated Approach to Stopping Wife Abuse. Gondolf, Edward W. Holmes Beach, FL: Learning Pub, Inc., 1985.

Discusses the issues and techniques around helping men to stop battering. Includes an annotated bibliography and an index. (*More recent books by the same author have updated information*)

The Mistreatment of Elderly People. Decalmer, Peter and Glendenning, Frank, eds. London: Sage Pub, 1993.

Drawing together reports from various professions, this book includes clinical and legal perspectives on elder abuse (in the UK) and provides an overview of the key research and theoretical explanations of elder abuse. Presents "Guidelines for Action". Includes an index.

More than Victims: Battered Women, the Syndrome Society, and the Law.(Review) (book reviews) : An article from: Criminal Justice Ethics. (Morality and Society Series) Holly Maguigan. 1996. Chicago, Ill: U of Chicago Press.

A sympathetic and powerful analysis of the problems attending the use of battered-woman syndrome as a legal defense, ultimately revealing how the syndrome's logic actually harms those it is trying to protect. A persuasive account of how constitutional freedom and individual justice can be threatened by current legal standards, this thorough yet accessible work presents a dramatic rethinking of the criminal justice system.

Mothering Through Domestic Violence Lorraine Radford and Marianne Hester. Jessica Kingsley Pub. London 2006

Based on findings from six primary research studies, this book reveals how undermining mothering – specifically, family courts and social work agencies blaming mothers for their own victimization – plays a key role in locking women into abusive relationships and exacerbating the damage done by domestic violence. Case studies are used to explore

key issues that should be considered during assessment and planning, such as the psychological impact on children of living in an abusive household; mother and child protection from an abusive partner during court proceedings; and child contact with an abusive parent.

Mujeres Que Aman A Mujeres. Woodrow, Terry. (Compiladora) Barcelona: Robin Book, 1989.

Naming the Violence: Speaking Out About Lesbian Battering Lobel, Kerry, ed. (For the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence Lesbian Task Force) Seattle, WA: Seal Press, 1986.

Anthology of essays by battered lesbians telling of their relationships. Also includes articles that analyze the dynamics and strategies of battering. Contains workshops addressing homophobia.

Next Time, She'll Be Dead: Battering and How to Stop It

Jones, Ann. Boston, MA; Beacon Press, 1994.

By the author of *Women Who Kill*, this book questions the very basis with which we view "domestic violence" and suggests that we shift the legal inquiry and focus from the "battered woman" to the "battering man." In addition to answering the age old question of "Why doesn't she leave?". Jones offers answers to the less frequently asked question "What can we do?".

Nuestros Cuerpos, Nuestras Vidas The Boston Women's Health Book Collective. NYC: Seven Stories Press, 2000. (2 Copies)

The Spanish language adaptation of *Our Bodies, Ourselves*. This culturally relevant adaptation addresses the social, spiritual, and health issues that most concern women of Latin American descent in this country and throughout the Americas. Also available in English.

Our Bodies, Ourselves, a book by and for women. Updated and expanded for the 1990's The Boston Women's Health Book Collective. NYC: Simon and Schuster, 1992.

Book available to help survivors cope and understand

Point Last Seen. Hannah Nyala. Portland, Or: Book News, Inc.,2002

A member of a National Park Service search-and-rescue team recounts rescue missions and her experience escaping from an abusive marriage. She explores the cultural meanings of tracking in America and in the Kalahari Desert.

Programs for Men Who Batter: Intervention and prevention strategies in a diverse society.

Aldarondo, Etiony and Mederos, Fernando, eds. Kingston, NJ: Civic Research Institute, 2002.

The editors, recognized experts in batterer studies, address the public safety, criminal justice, societal, cultural, and clinical issues surrounding batterer interventions. They focus on the critical need for intervention program providers to hold batterers accountable for their actions, and to coordinate program services with domestic violence victim services groups. Focus of report is on the practical aspects of doing psychotherapy with torture survivors and their families.

***MISSING Race, Gender, and Work** Amott, Teresa L. and Matthaei, Julie A. South End Press; Boston, Mass. 1991.

A multicultural economic history of women in the United States. This book "begins with a conceptual framework that highlights 'three categories . . .--gender, race-ethnicity, and class--as interconnected, historical processes of domination and subordination.' The bulk of the book is devoted to historical sketches of six groups of women: American Indian, Chicanas, European American, African American, Asian American, and Puerto Rican." (Choice) Index.

The Rape Victim: Clinical and Community Interventions Koss, Mary P. and Harvey, Mary R. Second Edition. Newbury Park, CA: Sage Pub, 1991.

Examines rape from various angles: its impact and the clinical treatment of the victim, the responsibility of the community, and its prevention. Includes an index.

Reaching Men: Strategies for Preventing Sexist Attitudes, Behaviors and Violence. Rus Ervin Funk Jist Works 2006

Rus Funk, an experienced advocate for women's safety and well-being, explores the foundations of reaching men to address domestic violence, sexual violence, pornography and prostitution, sexual harassment and stalking. He examines how these forms of violence are connected under the umbrella of sexism, and then he moves to discuss how, based on this analysis, to effectively engage men.

Sacrificing Ourselves for Love. Why Women Sacrifice Health and Self-Esteem... And How to Stop. Jane Wegscheider Hyman and Esther Rome, in cooperation with the Boston Women's Health Book Collective 1996

Many women and girls risk health and well-being in order to please others. In an unflinching look at this pervasive problem, *Sacrificing Our Selves for Love* explains society's role in promoting this sacrifice and provides exercises to counter societal pressure. Powerful personal testimony from women who have suffered and decided to change is highlighted throughout.

Saving Bernice: Battered Women, Welfare, and Poverty Raphael, Jody. Boston, MA: Northern University Press, 2000.

This book gives insight into the lives of millions of poor women and the serious obstacles they must overcome on the path out of poverty.

The Scared Child: Helping Kids Overcome Traumatic Events. Barbara Brooks, Paula M. Siegel. NYC: Wiley & Sons 1996.

Kids don't always know how to react to feelings of distress. If these scared feelings are not expressed in a positive way, they can surface later in life when dealing with them becomes more difficult. Most women's movement coverage tend to be national in scope, so it's especially important to see the continued updating of an essay anthology which mixes women's opinions from around the world; especially the 'Global South'. From personal 'herstories' to data on women, this promises something for everyone

The Spider & the Fly: How to spot the signs and symptoms of abuse—and how to stop it.

Raffaelli, Ruth M. NYC: Dell Publishing, 1997.

A self help book for women that contains self tests, case studies, and sample dialogue to help the reader fully explore her relationship and determine if it is abusive in any way.

Substance Abuse, Family Violence, and Child Welfare: Bridging Perspectives

Hampton, Robert L.; Senatore, Vincent; Gullotta, Thomas P. eds. Thousand Oaks, CA: Sage Pub, Inc., 1998.

For "...all who are concerned about the well-being of our children." Explores the links among issues, offers suggestions for collaborative prevention and intervention programs and policies.

The Survivor's Guide. Lee, Sharice A. Thousand Oaks, CA: Sage Pub, Inc., 1995.

A pocket-sized handbook, designed to support and educate adolescent survivors of sexual abuse. Uses very simple, clear language and provides a glossary.

Surviving Sexual Violence. (Paperback). Liz Kelly University of Minnesota Press 1988.

Based on taped interviews. Presents detailed findings about the prevalence of sexual violence in the lives of 60 women.

Surviving Domestic Violence: Voices of Women Who Broke Free. Elaine Weiss. Ca.: Volcano Press 2000

SURVIVING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE tells the stories of twelve women. Each was a victim of domestic violence, escaped from her abuser, reclaimed her dignity, reconstructed her life, and rediscovered peace. Domestic violence doesn't just happen "out there" somewhere. It happens in our town, in our neighborhood, on our street. It happens to women we see at work, the supermarket, the movie theater, the ballet and the PTA board meeting.

Susan B. Anthony Slept Here: A Guide to American Women's Landmarks. Lynn Sherr Jurate Kazickas NYC: Three Rivers Press, 1994

Originally published in 1976 as *The American Woman's Gazetteer*, this updated version is a travel guide through towns, cities, and states, packed with facts about the role women have played in shaping U.S. history. The thorough index and the alphabetical arrangement by state makes the book useful as a reference source; it's also fun for browsing. The abundance of photographs and various locales encourages readers to journey through the pages. Interesting trivia is scattered throughout. This source complements *Notable American Women, 1607-1950* (1971) and *Notable American Women: The Modern Period* (1980, both Belknap), and Doreen Rappaport's *American Women* (HarperCollins, 1992).

Talking it Out: A guide to groups for abused women. NiCarthy, Ginney Merriam, Karen & Coffman, Sandra. 1984. Seal Press

This bestselling and indispensable guide is straightforward, sensible, and empathetic. With practical and gentle guidance, the authors help women work towards building relationships that are healthier and, most importantly, safer.

Trauma and Recovery: The Aftermath of Violence--from Domestic Abuse to Political Terror (Paperback). Herman, Judith, M.D. BasicBooks 1992, 1997

In the intervening years, Herman's now classic volume has changed the way we think about and treat traumatic events and trauma victims. In a new introduction, Herman chronicles the incredible response the book has elicited and explains how the issues surrounding the topic of trauma and recovery have shifted within the clinical community and the culture at large. Trauma and Recovery brings a new level of understanding to a set of problems usually considered individually. Herman draws on her own cutting-edge research on domestic violence, as well as on a vast literature of combat veterans and victims of political terror, to show the parallels between private terrors such as rape and public traumas such as terrorism. The book puts individual experience in a broader political frame, arguing that psychological trauma can be understood only in a social context. Meticulously documented and frequently using the victims own words as well as those from classic literary works and prison diaries, Trauma and Recovery is a powerful work that will continue to profoundly impact our thinking.

The first book to explore the issue of abuse in adolescents--both the residual effects of earlier child abuse and current or cumulative abuse--this volume provides a sensitive account of how to optimize the value of therapeutic contact with this challenging and compelling population. Condemning torture under all political systems, this report spells out a global program for its abolition

Violence against women has been recognized as a human rights violation. The first part of this report seeks to provide an understanding of the international human rights framework and its weaknesses in addressing adequately violence against women. The second part discusses the reality of situations of violence against women in different countries around the world as well as the developments and implementation of international women's rights at that level

This is a no-nonsense, unsentimental and practical guide for parents in the nuclear age.

When Battered Women Kill. Browne, Angela. NYC: The Free Press, 1987.

Presents the personal experiences of several battered women who ultimately killed their abusers. Combines interviews with extensive research findings on domestic violence, its progression, its effects on women, and the events and factors leading women to their ultimate attempt to escape. Provides a brief description of the legal terminology and processes involved.

When Love Goes Wrong: What To Do When You Can't Do Anything Right--Strategies for Women With Controlling Partners. Jones, Ann and Schechter, Susan. NYC: Harper Perennial, 1992.

Information for women in abusive relationships, including how to get out of them. Concludes with an annotated bibliography, index, and a list of organizations including abortion referral and career education.

A Woman Like You, The Face Of Domestic Violence. Anderson, Vera. Seattle, Washington: The Seal Press, 1997.

Interviews with women of diverse ethnicity and backgrounds relaying their experiences with domestic violence and their survival. Includes suggested reading material and resources.

Woman-to-Woman Sexual Violence: Does She Call It Rape? Lori B. Girshick
Northeastern University Press 2002

This provocative book offers much-needed insights on a subject rarely discussed in the literature on domestic violence, and it does so with compassion. Above all, it recommends how agencies can best provide services, outreach, and treatment to survivors of woman-to-woman rape and lesbian battering, using suggestions by the survivors themselves.

Examines battering as a public health issue using theory, health consequences, and clinical interventions. Includes an index.

Women Sex and Addiction. Kasl Davis, Charolette. NYC: Reed Business Info Inc: 1990.

Certain women (and men) use sex addictively as a substitute for love, nurture or power, according to Minneapolis psychologist Kasl. "Crammed with case histories, diagrams and therapeutic suggestions, this study draws on her work with members of two organizations: Sex Addicts Anonymous, and Co-Dependents of Sex Addicts, a group for partners of so-called sex addicts."

Women who hurt themselves: A book of hope and understanding. Miller, Dusty NYC; Basic Books 1994.

Women traumatized in childhood hurt themselves more often than men do because men are socialized to act aggressively and fight back, notes psychologist Miller, who is director of Clinical Mentoring at Antioch/New England Graduate School. Here she addresses childhood trauma, to which the individual may react by dissociating, but such fragmentation of the personality becomes the basis of her failure to protect herself as an adult. While integrating various treatment approaches, Miller's program focuses on the "triadic self," which she describes as the victim, abuser and nonprotecting bystander within. Oscar® winning documentary about the magnitude and severity of domestic violence in this country. This educational video features four women imprisoned for killing their batterers and their terrifying personal testimonies. *Defending Our Lives* aims to educate people about domestic violence and to spur legislative and judicial reform. It is appropriate for people working on any aspect of this issue, including general education, legal reform, police training, battered women advocacy, counseling, prosecution and defense, human rights activism and community education.

Developing a Trauma-Informed System of Care. Video. Lecture by Dr. Maxine Harris at Boston University School of Public Health May 20, 1999.

Describes how a trauma-informed system of care can more appropriately and effectively work. Presents statistics on the co-existence and interrelated issues of substance abuse, mental illness, and a history of physical/sexual abuse.

Domestic Abuse: A Challenge to the Media and the Courts. Video. Providence, RI: Women's Center of Rhode Island and Providence Journal Co. 1993. 67 min.

Sarah Buel relates her story of abuse and how legal and social services agencies actually work against battered women.

***MISSING Domestic Violence and Stalking** Video. Lightbridge Productions, 1998. 17 min.

This program is designed to inform and educate young women about stalkers and the dangers they pose. Dramatic segments introduce Rachel and Carmen, two women attempting to end their relationships. As confrontations between these women and their partners are shown, the traits and typical behavior of stalkers are clearly revealed. Through a support group, these women gain further insight into the stalking personality, as well as resources to turn to for more information. Legal actions, safety measures, and how to avoid being vulnerable to a stalker's attack are also covered. Finally, the importance of taking action early and having little or no contact with the stalker is emphasized.

Domestic Violence and Stalking (Spanish). Video. Lightbridge Productions, 1998. 17 min.

Domestic Violence and Substance Abuse. Video. Lightbridge Productions, 1994. 23 min. Grades 9-Adult.

This program demonstrates different forms of emotional and sexual violence, and common ways in which people rationalize the abuse of substances and one another. *Also available in Spanish: see Violencia Domestica y Abuso Substancial.*

Domestic Violence and Young Adults. Video. Lightbridge Productions, 1994. 23 min.

This program looks at the components of dating violence, from physical attacks to mental and emotional abuse. Also examined are key causes of youth dating violence, from pervasive media messages to behavior patterns inflicted on the abuser at home. . Grades 9-Adult *Also available in Spanish: see Violencia Domestica y Adultos Jovenes.*

Domestic Violence Arrests. Beyond the Obvious, Improving Strategies in the New Millennium. 2000. Video Exercises. 40-min video, 10-15 min. segments.

This video was produced by the California Alliance against Domestic Violence (CAADV), in partnership with the Los Angeles City Attorney's Office and the Los Angeles Police Department. Designed to train law enforcement officers in methods of identifying the "primary" or "dominant" aggressor in domestic violence situations. Instead of the usual didactic lecture format, the video and exercises engage viewers in an open-ended dialogue/discussion process. A series of dramatic reenactments illustrate some of the challenges police officers and deputies face when responding to domestic violence calls, especially ambiguous cases in which more than one partner has injuries. Role-play segments demonstrate techniques for untangling conflicting stories and evidence. Action scenes are paused at intervals to give trainees a chance to respond to questions about how to proceed with the investigation, as if they were the officer on the scene. This video has a companion curriculum.

Domestic Violence Danger Assessment and Safety Planning. DVD 81 min. Emerge , Inc (3 copies)

Created as a part of a grant from the Department of Justice, this DVD consists of scenarios with a police officer, prosecutor and victim's advocate interviewing a victim, with narration provided throughout. This is a helpful training tool for law enforcement and battered women advocates, as well as abuser education program counselors and administrators.

Domestic Violence Screening for Healthcare Professionals. Video. N.H. Coalition Against Domestic Violence.

Offers three vignettes of a health care provider screening a patient for domestic or dating violence.

Dreamworlds II. Video. Media Education Foundation, 1995. 57 min.

Since its release in 1991, over three million students and others have seen *Dreamworlds*. Updated in 1995, *Dreamworlds II* combines powerful imagery from some two hundred videos with incisive narrative to educate viewers on the impact of sexual imagery in music videos.

WARNING: This video features a very disturbing scene of sexual violence. It is imperative that viewers be properly warned of this and are given the option of leaving the room.

Elder Abuse: Five Case Studies. Terra Nova Films n.d., 40 min. A viewer's **guide** is available.

Facing Diversity: Responding to Violence Against Women from Different Cultures. Video. Justice Institute of British Columbia. 43 min.

This video serves as an ideal training tool for staff and volunteers who work with a diverse population of victims of partner violence, and may also function as a beneficial community educational supplement about domestic abuse. *Facing Diversity* helps to raise awareness of the issues and barriers faced by women from diverse cultures; illustrates specific, culturally-sensitive practices for police, prosecutors, and victim advocates to support and assist women to end the violence. Examples from Hispanic, East Asian and South Asian cultures are shown.

Families in Trouble: Learning to Cope. Video. Pleasantville, NY: Sunburst Communications, 1990. 35 min. teacher's guide

Tells the stories of three young people who experience the coping process by dealing with the crises they face at home -- sibling alcoholism, divorce, and child abuse. The program also helps students understand family dynamics and the importance of family roles. Grade 8 -12

Family Violence: Clinical Implications. [1st video in series] Video. University of Minnesota's School of Dentistry and the program Against Sexual Violence, n.d. 10 min.

Created to assist the dental professional to observe injuries to the head and neck that are the result of family violence. Dentists and allied dental team members will learn how to evaluate the differences between accidental injuries and intentionally inflicted injuries.

Family Violence: Intervention Model for Dental Professionals. [2nd video in series] Video. University of Minnesota's School of Dentistry and the program Against Sexual Violence, n.d. 10 min.

This video features vignettes of dental office protocol for working with victims/survivors of family violence as well as the challenges of dealing with abusive individuals in the office setting. Dentists and dental staff will learn how to address violence issues and gain insights on providing an office that is a safe place for victims.

Five Out of Five. Chenzira, Ayoka. Video. Distributed by Women Make Movies: NYC, 1987.

This rap rock music video, which features the acting teen theater from New York Women Against Rape, looks at the problem of child and teen sexual abuse.

Game Over: Gender, race & violence in video games. Video. Media Education Foundation, 2000 41 min.

"...examines the nature and consequences of simulated violence, and encourages high school and college students to think critically about how gender and race are depicted in the video and computer games they play..."

Getting Men Involved: in childcare, education and social work Video Kidsafety 2001 18 min

With the help of nationally renowned experts, viewers learn ways to recruit and retain males in traditionally female dominated professions such as daycare, primary education and social work. Educators and caregivers also learn about organizational challenges, resistance to change and successful implementation strategies.

Getting Men Involved: young men as fathers. Video. Kidsafety, 2001, 2002. 17 min.

In an MTV style, young men (and women too) learn about fatherhood through a cross section of young fathers from Washington DC to Los Angeles, California. Although this video targets young fathers (and fathers-to-be) in their teens and twenties, young women can also gain a new perspective on their mates/partners.

The Healing Years: a documentary about surviving incest and child sexual abuse Center for the Prevention of Sexual & Domestic Violence n.d., 52 min. Study guide.

Hidden Victims: Child Domestic Violence. Narrated by Dylan McDermott. (School version) Video. Chatsworth, CA: AIMS Multimedia, n.d. 30 mins.

An unparalleled view of the real consequences of living with domestic violence, and the devastating effects which domestic violence has on children: during childhood and later on in life. Four families are graphically profiled. NOTE: This presentation contains graphic descriptions of violent episodes of domestic violence occurring in families with young children.

Easily adapted to any community awareness program or women's shelter, Hostages at Home features 5 women from different ethnic and socioeconomic groups who have survived domestic violence. This program dispels myths about domestic violence and examines the effects on the community as a health issue.

HRSA Domestic Violence Training Series

Imagine. Video. 1998 Kathleen Alexander. Ashfield: Witness to Violence 20 min.

Video presents four women who are victims of domestic violence. The women speak to themselves, confront their abusers, confide in their neighbors but are ultimately alone and silent in a violent relationship. The sound of drums punctuates the voices of these women and echoes their emotions. The set is stark, the script is more poetry than prose. The focus is on the women their voices, their movements and the sound of the percussion instruments.

In Love and In Danger. Video/Study guide available. Intermedia: Seattle, WA, n.d. 15 min.
Several experts and a survivor discuss the issue of teen dating violence; warning signs, and how it compares to domestic violence. “Featuring Barrie Levy, author of the book of the same title, this video is a compelling and informative look at the issue of teen dating violence. Emphasizing how stereotypes are formed and reinforced in early adolescence, how some young men intimidate and control young women in dating relationships.”

In Our Best Interest, part 2. Video.

Shows how abusers batter and control. Shows the woman’s rage and how it affects the mind.

Domestic violence from a child’s point of view.

Judicial Review Hearings in Domestic Violence Cases. 2004. Video/DVD

Lookin’ Out 4 U: Three stories about abusive relationships. Video with leader’s guide.

Rochester, NY: Metro Council for Teen Potential, 2003. 29 min.

Stories of three teen couples in abusive relationships. The stories feature a multiracial company of actors to defuse the idea that any conditions are specific or more prevalent to any racial, economic, ethnic or gender group. The Leader’s guide features suggestions for classroom strategies and skills practice discussion; and role-play.

Love's not supposed to hurt. Video. Intermedia, Seattle, WA.

Presents a simple narrative story designed to elicit thought and dialogue about the issues of dating violence. "Presented to a live audience of college students, this video provides the impetus for discussion, awareness, and understanding of the complex issue of dating violence. Designed for young adults, *Love's Not Supposed to Hurt* also investigates other important areas connected to physical violence such as stalking, harassment, the role of alcohol in violent behavior, self-esteem and emotional abuse."

No Visible Bruises: The Katie Koestner Story. Video. Home Box Office Family 1993

The story of Katie Koestner, a college student who was a victim of date rape. It highlights the difficulty she had getting support when she decided to report the rape, and how she determinedly convinced the dean of her school that she wanted to pursue disciplinary action. The video closes with a statement from the real Katie, describing date rape and sharing that 90% of college rapes go unreported and only 1/100 men are caught.

Once Can Hurt a Lifetime. Marilyn Van Derbur. One Voice .Video. 30 min.

Video educates through the use of narrative by Ms. Van Derbur, a one time Ms. America and incest survivor herself, and stories by survivors of childhood sexual abuse who were abused by teenage offenders. Featuring survivors of sexual abuse, this video also teaches us how to listen and help survivors, what to do when abuse is discovered, as well as prevent and stop the cycle of sexual abuse. For schoolteachers, parents and victims as well as anyone who thinks "it's no big deal, it only happened once".

Pink Triangles. Video. Cambridge: Cambridge Documentary Films 1992. 35 min.

An educational video about homophobia and oppression was produced by a group of nine women and men, both gay and straight, who work as health workers, teachers, social workers, mental health counselors, historians and in photography, print and film "Pink Triangles" was one of the very first films to confront the growth homophobia in American life and served to alert audiences to the danger of scapegoating and violence that can occur in any society. Pink Triangles is a documentary film that challenges some of our most deeply-rooted feelings: our attitudes toward homosexuality. This film is aimed at all viewers who are interested in examining the common roots of the oppression of all of those who are defined as "out of the mainstream."

Survivors of domestic violence and various professionals describe the role of the police and courts in the process of obtaining orders of protection. Encourages women to seek help from the legal system and hold their abuser accountable.

Safe: Inside a Battered Woman's Shelter. Video. Intermedia Seattle, WA. 49 min.
Narrated by Susan Sarandon. This program looks at women's lives after leaving their abusers; as they deal with complex issues of separation, the legal system; the impact of domestic violence on their children; and their own recovery from abuse. Also examined are issues women and their children encounter when living in a shelter; and adapting to living with other survivors of domestic abuse. Originally aired on the Discovery Channel as a 1hour special, this version includes 4 min. that were cut out of the Discovery Channel program.

Seven Lucky Charms Video. by Lisa Mann 1980. 16 min

"Husbands kill their wives because of bruised egos; wives generally kill their husbands because of bruised bodies." This documentary weaves animated imagery with statistical information to provide an understanding of battered women, especially those who kill in self-defense. Violence and retaliation, inadequate police response, gender inequities in the legal system and prison sentencing are all examined in a clear and inventive way.

Sex, Power & the Workplace – life guides. PBS:KCET .Video 60 min

This video is an effective tool for both victims and employers who want to reduce or eliminate sexual harassment in their companies. Through compelling expert interviews and sensitive profiles of five people victimized by sexual harassment, this PBS program explores the critical issues and offers insights into way to improve sexual equality in the working environment.

Sexual Abuse and Eating Disorders. Sexual Abuse and Eating Disorders. Mark F. Schwartz Leigh Cohn, Eds. St. Louis, MO: Masters & Johnson Institute,.

Research for psychotherapists on the relationship between sexual abuse and eating disorders. Discusses prevalence and causal relationships. Case studies.

Sexual Harassment: Building Awareness on campus. 24 min. Hosted by Jean Kilbourne Video. Media Education Foundation 1995

Shaking, Hitting, Spanking: What to Do Instead. .Mike Arnow. Family Development Resources. 1990. 30min.

Shows viewers that true discipline does not mean using force. Viewers meet four parents facing very realistic problems: a stressed out mother with a crying baby; dangerous situations; disobedience; making children do things they do not want to do. After each situation, viewers stop and discuss what they might do in a similar situation.

The Silent Witness March Video. Video 1997

A 10-minute inspirational video describing the national march in Washington D.C., highlighting the Silent Witness Exhibit's goals and effects on people. Useful for conferences, college classes, or as a tool to sell others on the idea.

Sisters, Mothers, Daughters Orlando, Dale. Video. Polaris Corporation, 1997. 30 min. **(2 copies)**

This documentary commemorates, through memories of family members, the lives of two mothers and one teenager murdered by their husbands and boyfriend.

Small Justice: Little Justice in America's Family Courts. Waller, Garland. Video. Intermedia, Seattle, WA. 56 min.

This new program explores the family court system that routinely takes children away from the protective parent and puts them in the care of the person the children have named as their abuser. Follows the stories of three dedicated women and their lawyers.

Stuart Hall: Race, the floating signifier (classroom edition) Video. Media Education Foundation, n.d., 60 min.

Hall shows that the meaning of racial signifiers (like skin color) are never fixed, but depend upon cultural context.

Stuart Hall: Representation and the media. Video. Media Education Foundation, 1997 55 min. (Introductory lecture).

Hall shows how the media—especially the visual media—have become key players in the process of modern story telling.

Still Killing Us Softly: Advertising's Image of Women Video Cambridge Documentary Films n.d. 32 min

****Staff must accompany video loan**** Documentary based on the lectures of Dr. Jean Kilbourne about the portrayal of women in advertising and its connection to problems women face in society.

A Story of Hope Marilyn Van Derbur. Video 1999 Denver: Minnesota: Sidran Foundation 60 min

Presents a speech given by Marilyn Van Derbur two weeks after she disclosed publicly in 1991 her personal story of child sexual abuse. Throughout the video, Van Derbur refers to doing the work of recovery, the setbacks and difficulties, and ultimately, the triumph that came with recovery.

Strong at the Broken Places: Turning Trauma into Recovery Video. Cambridge Documentary Films, 1998. 38 min.

An educational video about people, devastated by trauma and loss, who find common ground for their journeys to recovery. The story of vastly different lives; but the death camps of Cambodia, the violent streets of South Boston, the amputee ward of a V.A. hospital and the cell of an alcohol and drug addicted inmate yield remarkable survivors, all of whom heal themselves by helping others

Surviving the Family 17min 1993. Distributed by Carousel Film (**2copies**)

An educational film about incest.

Survivors: An Animated Film on Domestic Violence Sofian, Sheila. Video, study guide available 16min

Presents many of the issues of domestic violence as related through individual women's experiences. Topics covered are the dynamics of abuse; risk factors; lack of support from police, church, and family; the cycle of violence; the role of threats/mental abuse; and the dangers and difficulties associated with leaving an abuser.

Take A Stand Against Violence – House of Ruth. 1995 Video 12:45min

A powerful video featuring interviews with several survivors of domestic violence. Can be used for Community Outreach and Training. A very good "general" video on domestic violence.

Teen Sexuality in a Culture of Confusion. Dan Habib Media Ed. Foundation

This video explores the forces influencing young people's decisions about sex: media, friends, family, religion, love, AIDS, alcohol, and homophobia. In this program, award-winning documentarian and photojournalist Dan Habib features the stories of eight young people, ages 16-24. Two of the eight talk about living with AIDS

Think: Violence is for people who don't. Video. Harvard Pilgrim Health Care Foundation.

***MISSING Through My Eyes.** Video. Office for Victims of Crime. 1999 9 min.

Through the voices, artwork, and writings of children, child victims experience violence in their lives. The video helps viewers understand, from a child's viewpoint, the trauma children experience when they have been victims of abuse, have witnessed violence in the streets, or have seen their mothers beaten by their fathers. Experts in child development and mental health services for child victims explain the impact of exposure to violence on children and discuss the critical steps that lead to recovery. **UNAVAILABLE**

Tough Guise. Video. Media Education Foundation 1999 82 min. (2 copies).

The primary message is the “need to understand violence in American schools, which is inclusive of shootings, bullying, and teen dating violence as part of an ongoing crisis in masculinity reinforced by mass media imagery.”

This program demonstrates different forms of emotional and sexual violence, and common ways in which people rationalize the abuse of substances and one another.

Violencia Domestica y Adultos Jovenes. Video in Spanish—Young Adults and Domestic Violence. Lightbridge Productions, 1994. 23 min. Grades 9-Adult.

This program looks at the components of dating violence, from physical attacks to mental and emotional abuse. Also examined are key causes of youth dating violence, from pervasive media messages to behavior patterns inflicted on the abuser at home.

Violencia Domestica y Los Mujeres. Video in Spanish—Women and Domestic Violence.

Lightbridge Productions, 1994. 16 min. Grades 9-Adult.

This program tells the story of one young woman, Olivia, and how she took action to protect herself and her son from domestic violence.

Violencia Domestica y Los Ninos. Video in Spanish—Children and Domestic Violence. Lightbridge Productions, 1994. 16 min.

The program focuses on mothers who are abused and the effect it has on their children. Various forms of abuse are covered, and the warning signs of troubled behavior from the child of an abusive home are reviewed. Grades 9-Adult

Violencia Familiar: Una Perspective Masculina Video in Spanish. Intermedia Seattle, WA. 25 min.

Family Violence: A Male Perspective is a Spanish language video that tells the stories of four men who overcame their need to abuse and control their partners. Their stories reflect the effect violence had on their children; the harmful legacy from father to son that promotes violence; and the effect a “macho” culture had on them. Experts in family violence offer a perspective and discuss ways for abusers to change their behavior.

Voices Heard, Sisters Unseen. By Grace Poore. Shakti Productions 1995 Video.

A powerful and inspirational videotape showing how survivors of domestic violence are working to change the way the system treats battered women in search of justice and safety. Interviews, poetry, dance and music combine to present a feminist analysis about how courts, police and social services “re-victimize” battered women who are deaf, disabled, lesbians, prostitutes, HIV-positive and without official immigrant status.

Voices from the Front. Testing the Limits, 1991 USA 90 min.

The first feature-length documentary on AIDS activism in America makes clear the emotional and political effects of community activism using the voices of those directly engaged. It is a powerful distillation of pictures and words from events organized to change public consciousness, expose the failure of the health care systems, and challenge government inaction and neglect concerning AIDS.

Voices of Survivors. DV Survivors educate Physicians. FVVPF 2002 Video 30min

What is the physician's role in treating patients who are victims of domestic Violence? This 25-minute video is the ideal starting point for those unfamiliar or uncomfortable with domestic violence and its effects on the patient. Based on a series of interviews with survivors, both the background of abuse and the role the physician is expected to play are discussed. An accompanying companion guide provides practical, clinical information on the physical and psychological effects of domestic violence.

***Missing Warning Signs.** American Psychological Association/MTV: News & Specials. Video (Spanish) 1999 21:30 min..

A 30-minute MTV documentary on youth and violence. Nationwide presentations by psychologists to youth on the topic of violence. A "Warning Signs" guide on violence prevention available to youth and the general public free of charge.

War Zone. Video. Media Education Foundation. 1998 45 min.

A film about sex, power, and what happens when men threaten a woman's right to walk undisturbed on the streets. **Advisory:** graphic depictions of violence against women including rape.

What a Girl Wants. Video. Media Education Foundation. 2001 33 min.

Interviews with eleven girls aged 8 to 16 from a variety of socio-economic backgrounds and two classrooms of middle and high school students. Their insightful and provocative responses provide the central theme of the film; and, a half-hour examination of how the media presents girls. Juxtaposes footage culled from a typical week of TV broadcasting with original interviews.

Precursor to the video *What a Girl Wants*.

Training video for health care providers on domestic violence. Covers the basic issues, allowing the presenter(s) to provide more detailed information and to lead a discussion.

In Our Best Interest. Video and Facilitator's Guidebook. Duluth, MN: Duluth Domestic Abuse Intervention Project, Part I: 37 min., 1988; Part II: 105 min., 1992.

For use in a battered women's group.

Part I: Thirteen short scenes depicting a batterer using abusive tactics against his partner. Each scene facilitates discussion of a theme from the accompanying curriculum.

Part II: Four 20-25 min. lectures including tactics of batterers, societal factors that promote abuse against women, mental health and emotions.

Crimes Against the Future. Video, closed captioned. Revised. White Plains, NY: March of Dimes Birth Defects Foundation, 1987. 23:27 min.

Training video aimed at health care workers which discusses the effects on the fetus of a battered pregnant woman.

Living in a Violent Relationship: Stop the Cycle of Family Violence! (Course 1) Breaking the Silence: Stop the Cycle of Family Violence! (Course 2). Video and Workbook. San Jose, CA: 1993. Course 1: 77 min., 6 CEH, ANA; Course 2: 75 min., 6 CEH, ANA.

A course for nurses on domestic violence. The first half covers the dynamics of domestic violence and the psychological assessment of victims and perpetrators. The second half concerns medical assessments, reporting requirements, multicultural issues, gays and lesbians, and utilization of community resources. Lists addresses and phone numbers of state domestic violence coalitions.

More Than Words: Responding to Domestic Violence. Video and Study Guide. Urbana, IL: Baxley Media Group, 1994. Part I: 34 min.; Part II: 17 min.; Part III: 30 min.

Addresses health and social services professionals' role and responsibility in identification, assessment, and referral of battered women.

Part I: Covers the attitudes, knowledge, and skills needed by professionals.

Part II: Presents those skills

Part III: Six simulations of battered women interacting with service professionals.

The three parts are intended for use together, but they can be viewed independently. Discussion after each is recommended.

No Punching Judy. McCue, Margi. Video and coloring book. Huntington, NY: The Bureau for At-Risk Youth, 1994. Part I: 30 min.; Part II: Training video for teachers, 16 min.

Part I: Puppet show that depicts a family with domestic violence and traditional gender roles of male domination, female subordination.

Part II: Guide for teachers when their students disclose domestic violence in their families; promotes re-defining gender roles, helping children to stay safe, teaching children that the violence is not their fault and that they cannot change it.

Training video for facilitating a batterers' group which employs the power and control philosophy to explain heterosexual battering.

Part II: Six formerly battered women describe the abusive tactics used by their batterers and the impact on their families.

Part III: An offenders' group shares their stories.
