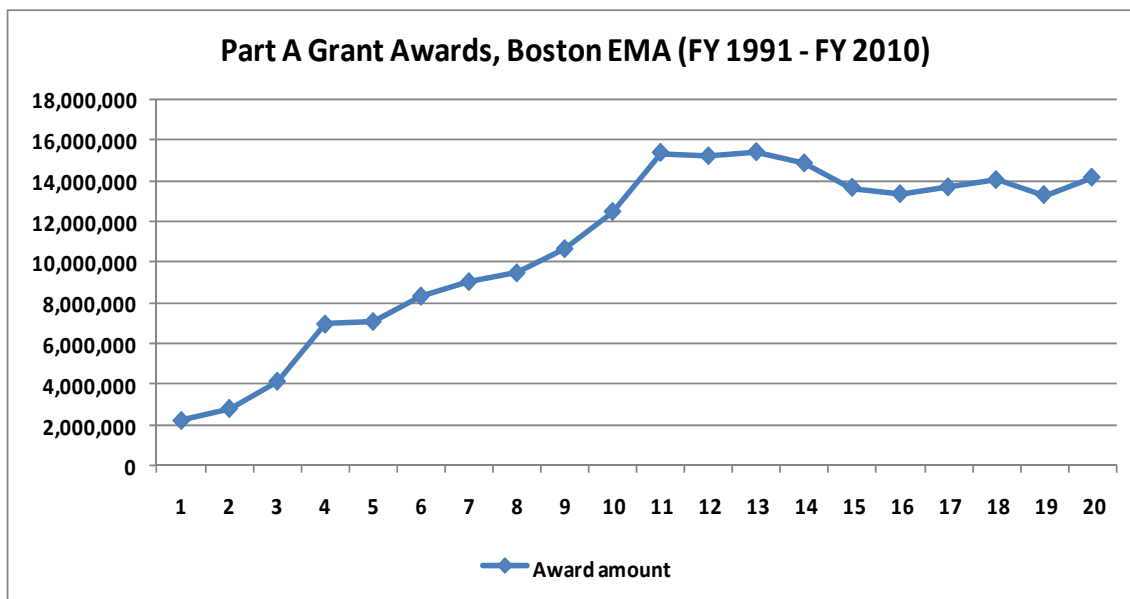

## RYAN WHITE HIV/AIDS TREATMENT MODERNIZATION ACT PART A BACKGROUND

---

The Ryan White Comprehensive AIDS Resources Emergency (CARE) Act, of 1990 as amended in 1996 and 2000, was replaced by the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Treatment Modernization Act of 2006. Funds from Part A (formerly known as Title I) provide direct financial assistance to Eligible Metropolitan Areas (EMA) and Transitional Grant Areas (TGA) that have been the most severely affected by the HIV epidemic, and are intended to develop or to enhance access to a comprehensive continuum of high quality, community-based care for low-income individuals and families with HIV disease. A comprehensive continuum of care should include primary medical care and supportive services which aim to promote health and enhance quality of life. The HIV/AIDS Bureau (HAB) of the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) administers the Ryan White Program. Part A formula and supplemental grants are awarded to each EMA's Chief Elected Official (CEO). The CEO appoints an HIV/AIDS Services Planning Council and designates a Grantee. The Planning Council establishes priorities and develops a plan for meeting those priorities. The Boston Public Health Commission, the designated Grantee, must distribute grant funds according to the priorities established by the Planning Council.

The Boston EMA has received a total of \$213,630,710 in Part A grant awards since FY 1991. The graph below illustrates the Part A Boston EMA award allocations each fiscal year.

RYAN WHITE PART A OVERVIEW

---

For FY 2010, HRSA awarded a Part A grant to the CEO of the Boston EMA (Mayor, City of Boston) in the amount of \$14,148,413. The Boston EMA HIV/AIDS Services Planning Council established the ranking of priority services and service category allocations (see table). The Boston Public Health Commission (the Grantee), through a contract renewal process, funded 99 programs within 50 agencies in accordance with the Planning Council's priorities.

## RYAN WHITE PART A MINORITY AIDS INITIATIVE OVERVIEW

---

After the original FY 1999 award of Minority AIDS Initiative (MAI) funds, the Planning Council reviewed the MAI guidelines and recommended the Boston EMA create a single new MAI service category. Agencies funded in the MAI category provide Medical Case Management and/or Psychosocial Support (PS) services that target PLWH from disproportionately impacted minority communities.

Under the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Treatment Modernization Act of 2006, MAI was codified as a separate and distinct grant program for which local cities and urban areas had to compete. As a result, federal funding for MAI programs ended on February 28, 2007. Federal awards for the new competitive MAI program started on August 1, 2007 for FY 2007 (Year 1 of the Part A MAI program). On July 21, 2008, HRSA awarded a Minority AIDS Initiative grant to the Boston EMA in the amount of \$843,100 for FY 2008. This amount represented an increase of \$28,238 (3.5%) over the amount of \$814,862 received under the FY 2007 Part A MAI program. In FY 2009, Minority AIDS Initiative grant for the Boston EMA was awarded on August 13, 2009 in the amount of \$845,424, an increase of \$2,324 (0.28%) over the amount received in FY 2008.

Under the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Treatment Extension Act of 2009, MAI no longer exists as a separate grant program for which local cities and urban areas have to compete for. Instead, the MAI program would continue under Part A according to a formula which is based on the distribution of populations disproportionately impacted by HIV/AIDS. The awards cycles for MAI now coincide with Part A cycles (March 1 – February 28). Federal award was granted for FY 2010 to the Boston EMA on March 5, 2010 in the amount of \$ 813,845. The funding for FY 2010 was a decrease of \$31,579 (3.7%) of the amount received in FY 2009.

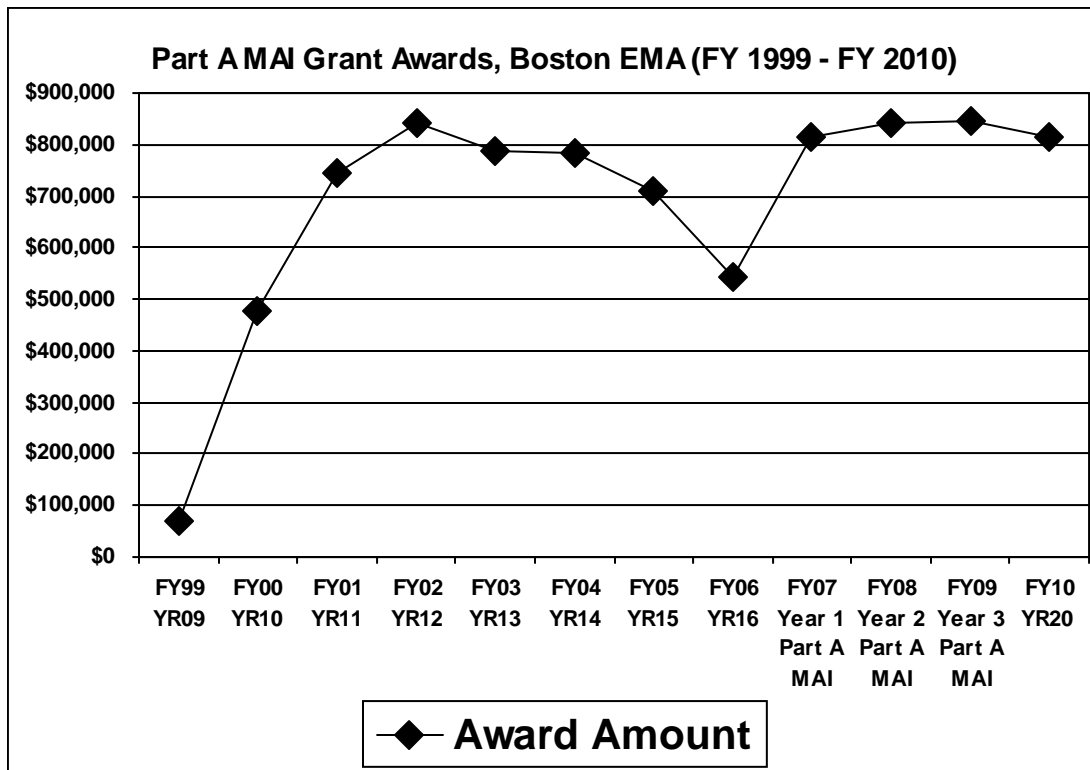

In accordance with the Planning Council's guidelines, the Boston Public Health Commission, continued funding through a contract extension process for the 8 MAI programs which were previously funded under the contract renewal process of FY 2007.

While this is the first year of funding under the revised legislation, the graph below illustrates the MAI awards since FY 1999.

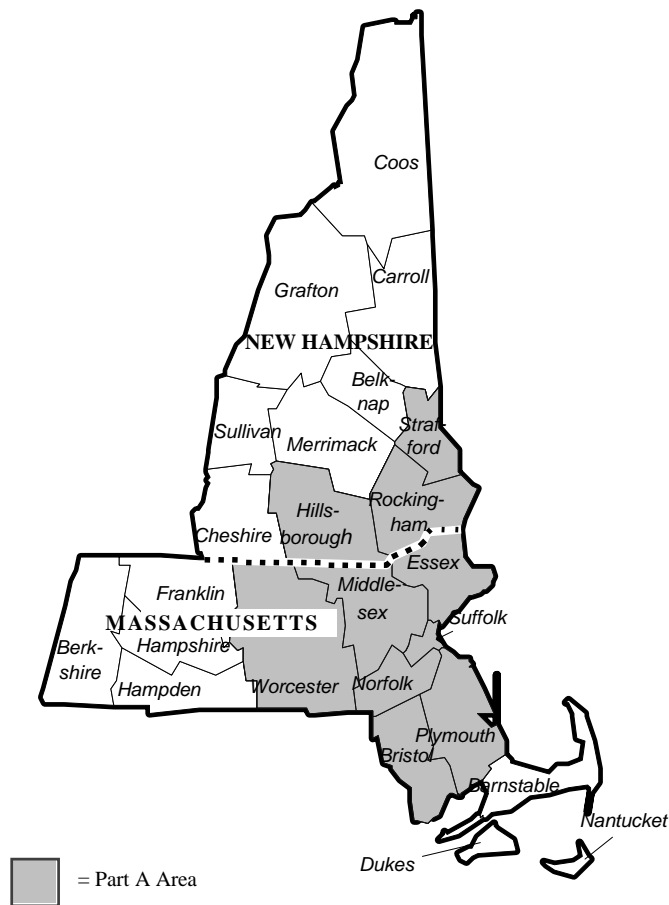

## PART A BOSTON ELIGIBLE METROPOLITAN AREA

---

The Boston Eligible Metropolitan Area (EMA) service region includes 7 counties in Massachusetts – Bristol, Essex, Middlesex, Norfolk, Plymouth, Suffolk and Worcester – and 3 counties in New Hampshire – Hillsborough, Rockingham and Strafford. All organizations in the EMA that provide or propose to provide HIV-related services for people living in the EMA are eligible to apply for Part A funding.

## PLANNING COUNCIL SERVICE DEFINITIONS

---

### **Client Advocacy**

Services funded under this category provide short-term "specialized" assistance to clients throughout the process of accessing and obtaining financial and legal services that include, but which are not limited to: healthcare benefits, immigration, social security and disability benefits.

### **Dental**

Services funded under this category are recruitment of dentists and preventive diagnostic and therapeutic services rendered by dentists, dental hygienists and other dental practitioners.

### **Drug Reimbursement**

The service funded under this category is the provision of medically prescribed pharmaceuticals used in the prevention, management, and treatment of HIV disease.

### **Food Services**

The service funded under this category is the provision of calorically and nutritionally appropriate prepared food, which may include, but is not limited to: prepared meals; congregate meals; home delivered food; food banks; nutritional supplements; and the provision of nutritional counseling under the supervision of a registered dietician.

### **Housing**

Services funded under this category include the provision of short-term and/or emergency rental assistance, the provision of housing support in a group home or scattered site setting, and emergency housing-related expenses such as utilities. These services also include assessment, search, placement, and advocacy services provided by those who possess an extensive knowledge of local, State, and Federal housing programs and how they can be accessed.

### **Mental Health**

Services funded under this category are psychological and psychiatric treatment, counseling and case consultation services provided by professional therapists (licensed or authorized within the state).

### **Medical Case Management**

Historically known as Case Management, services funded under this category provide client-centered services that link clients with primary medical care and health-related support services in a manner that ensures timely, coordinated access to appropriate levels of care. Client-centered services support a client's ability in maximizing his/her self-sufficiency and independence. Key activities include: information and referral; assessment of the client's needs and personal support systems; development of a comprehensive individualized service care plan; coordination of the services required to implement the plan; client monitoring to assess the efficacy of the plan; periodic reassessment; and adoption of the plan.

**Minority AIDS Initiative (Medical Case Management & Psychosocial Support)**

Services funded under this category include Medical Case Management and/or Psychosocial Support services. The goals of these services are to (1) support racial and ethnic minority individuals living with HIV in their effort to enter into and remain in primary health care and health-related support services and (2) help improve the clinical health outcomes and quality of life of people of color living with HIV/AIDS. These services provide coordination of care and linkage to the full continuum of medical and health-related support services.

**Psychosocial Support**

Historically known as Peer Support, services funded under this category provide assistance to clients where the person(s) providing the service is a person infected with HIV and of the client's self-identified community and provide services to a full spectrum of individuals infected by HIV. Such services include the provision of culturally competent psychosocial support and assistance in obtaining a range of services and entitlement that will meet the needs of the client and are provided by licensed, or non-licensed, paraprofessional individuals.

**Primary Care**

Services funded under this category provide routine, non-emergency, non-inpatient medical care, case consultation, patient education, and OB/GYN services.

**Substance Abuse**

Services funded under this category may include: pretreatment program of recovery readiness; harm reduction; mental health counseling to reduce depression, anxiety and other disorders associated with substance abuse; drug-free treatment and counseling; neuro-psychiatric pharmaceuticals; relapse prevention in an outpatient or residential health service setting; and activities targeting persons with HIV disease so that they can be enrolled or retained in care/treatment services.

**Transportation**

Services funded under this category include, but are not limited to taxi vouchers and public and private transport services that enable clients and their caregivers to access HIV primary medical care and health-related support services.

---

## NON-DIRECT SERVICE DEFINITIONS

---

### **Grantee Administration**

Grantee Administration is responsible for the effective administration of the Ryan White Part A grant. This includes developing and enhancing mechanisms which allow access to a comprehensive continuum of high quality, community-based care for low-income individuals and families living with HIV. Grantee Administration is responsible for implementing the Planning Council's plan for services, which includes distributing funds according to planning council priorities and allocations; ensuring that services are available and accessible to eligible clients; developing and implementing requests for proposals, monitoring contracted providers; working with agencies to maximize distributed funds; providing technical assistance; preparing and submitting Part A funding application; and completing all required federal reporting requirements.

### **Planning Council Support Services**

This program is funded to provide staff support and professional planning services to the Part A Boston EMA HIV/AIDS Services Planning Council. Included is the development of an annual needs assessment and funding stream assessment; completion of a resource and allocation process; development of a comprehensive plan for the provision of HIV/AIDS services; and staff support to Planning Council and committees, including scheduling and arranging of all meetings.

### **Quality Management**

This service includes assisting direct service medical providers funded through the Ryan White Act to assure that funded services adhere to established HIV clinical practice standards and Public Health Services (PHS) guidelines; implementing strategies for improvements to quality medical care including vital health-related supportive services to achieve appropriate access and adherence with HIV medical care; and utilizing available demographic, clinical and health care utilization information and health outcome data to monitor the spectrum of HIV-related illnesses and trends in the local epidemic and the impact of Part A services. Additional activities include formal evaluation projects as a comprehensive mechanism for evaluating the impact of Part A funds on HIV/AIDS care in the Boston EMA.

## CASE MANAGEMENT COLLABORATIVE

---

The Boston Public Health Commission, HIV/AIDS Services Division and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health, HIV/AIDS Bureau continue their funding and management of the Case Management Collaborative. The Collaborative combines Federal (Ryan White Act Part A and B) and State funding for case management services across the state and EMA.

Through the Collaborative, funding for case management was awarded through a single process. The purpose of the Collaborative is to improve the quality of life for PLWH across the state by funding an effective continuum of case management services, while reducing duplication of effort and utilizing dollars in a more effective manner. The priorities of the Collaborative are to fund case management services that help clients enter into and remain in primary care. Case management programs establish and maintain effective linkages with primary care and other service providers and ensure that case management services are not being duplicated across providers. In the process, programs facilitate each client's progress towards self-sufficiency. Services are also provided within a harm reduction framework and include basic risk assessment and risk reduction planning.
